May 11, 1960

Patricia Nepper, a senior at The College was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to study at Montpellier University in France. She was scheduled to leave in the following September and travel to Paris before heading to Montepelier. Her plans were to study French language and literature. Nepper was a French and English major at Scholastica. The Fulbright Scholarship was a means for European countries to pay their debts to the United States following World War II.

May 1, 1980

The first group of 26 students from The College returned home to Scholastica after nine weeks of travel. The students stayed in Louisburgh and traveled on weekends to explore the entirety of Ireland. The students said that they adjusted to the mist, slower lifestyle and the absence of washing machines. The highlight of the trip was singing in the pubs with the locals.

April 28, 2000

Saints Alive hosted a community event called Tower Meets Science. The goal was to foster a greater sense of unity on campus. Saints Alive was a newly formed organization that year which was filled with people who had concern about the CSS culture. This event showed that all majors were important. The event had a scavenger hunt, ice cream social and a contest to identify staff's baby pictures.

April 26, 2019
