
Students were also asked about the appropriate weather of wearing shorts as daily wear. With springtime temperatures, they are becoming more common for students, but there were a few who noted that they're a year round fashion. 14.3 percent of students found that shorts are a year round attire, appropriate for all weather conditions. However, this is largely refuted by the 42.9 percent who said that it requires a minimum temperature of 50 degrees and sun to show their calves in public.

25.7 percent of students opted to say that shorts are appropriate as long as the temperatures are above freezing. Whether this means freezing in relative terms or in the sense of 32 degrees Fahrenheit is unknown. Finally, the remaining students at 17.1 percent voted that shorts were only appropriate when the weather matched that of a sauna. No matter what you chose, all clothing is simply at the discretion of the wearer, but it's more work to shovel snow in shorts than in pants.

Finally, students were asked to note what streaming service they used most often. Unsurprisingly, 74.3 percent of students reported that they use Netflix as their prime streaming service. A few student recommendations to watch on this network included titles such as "Bridgerton," "Ginny & Georgia," "New Girl," "Schitt's Creek" and "The Blacklist."

In a tie with 34.3 percent of students each were Hulu and Disney+ as the next most popular services. Some popular Hulu recommendations were "Lost," "Letterkenny," "Brooklyn 99" and "The Handmaid's Tale." Some Disney+ recommendations are, well, all your old favorites as well as the new Marvel releases "WandaVision" and "Falcon and Winter Soldier."

After providing a brief background of Ursa Minor Brewing, Hugus then introduced the attendees to three distinct types of handcrafted beers: Buffalo Check Bock, Mike's Breakfast and Four Leafer.

First, Hugus introduced us to Buffalo Check Bock, which is a German style dark lager. In describing the taste, Hugus said, "It's almost got a sweetness to it; it's smooth, not bitter."

Second, Hugus introduced us to Mike's Breakfast, which is a breakfast stout that is part of Ursa Minor's breakfast series of crafted beers.

Lastly, Hugus introduced us to Four Leafer, which is an Irish stout with a dry and roasted flavor. Hugus mentioned that this brew would be perfectly paired with the spring days coming ahead.

Throughout the beer tasting event, attendees asked questions about the length of the brewing process, where malt products are obtained from and how the creative team uses innovation to make brews unique to Ursa Minor Brewing. The beer tasting event showcased the bond between chemistry and beer, specifically in our Duluth community.
