## COVID-19 vaccination deadline has passed

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The Oct. 22 deadline for students to submit proof of COVID-19 vaccination has passed. The Script sat down with Student Health Services to find out what comes next, now that St. Scholastica expects all students to fully vaccinated.

During an email interview, Laura Johnson, associate communications explained how director, most students submitted the required documentation by the deadline. Johnson said, "We are so pleased with our students' commitment to keeping our community healthy and safe."

As of Oct. 22, 88 percent of students on the Duluth campus are partially vaccinated, while 83 percent are fully vaccinated.

Within the overall Duluth community, 89 percent of community members are partially vaccinated, and 85 percent are fully vaccinated. 91 percent of CSS employees have received at least one dose of the vaccine, while 89 percent have completed their vaccination series.

The success in vaccination rates can be partially attributed to the vaccination clinics offered on campus. "We are really grateful to the Minnesota Department of Health, St. Louis County Public Health and Wal-Mart Pharmacies for their willingness to partner with our campus in bringing vaccine opportunities directly to our Duluth Campus Saints. While we don't have any additional vaccine clinics scheduled presently, it's definitely a possibility in the coming

months," Johnson explained.

For students who still need to receive their Student Health Services reminded campus community that the Minnesota COVID-19 Connector can be used to find a

nearby vaccination site. However, not all students submitted proof of vaccination by Oct. 22. Those who did not meet the deadline or file for an exemption can expect face difficulty when preparing for next semester. "A dean's hold will be placed on their record, and the student would not be permitted to register for semester classes spring until they show proof of vaccination. Some students are still finishing up their second dose. The hold for those students will be lifted

once they show proof of vaccination," Johnson said.

Despite this vaccination landmark, the virus remains at the College. While the Covid Alert Level is still labeled as "low" according Scholastica's COVID-19 Case Dashboard, Vaccination as of Oct. 20, two new student cases were reported, bringing the number of active infections to 10. The total number of confirmed cases this academic year now stands at 42. Four students are currently in isolation, and six students are in quarantine, all offcampus. In addition, three faculty/staff cases reported, were raising the total number of faculty/staff cases to 15.

The continual presence COVID-19 cases on campus presents a challenge

lifting restrictions. When asked if any changes are expected concerning COVID-19 policies now that all students are required to have been fully vaccinated, Johnson explained, "It really depends on whether we can get our cases down, increase vaccinations and assume the virus does not mutate in an unexpected way. We would love to lift restrictions if and when we can."

In order to get one step closer toward the lifting of restrictions, students must remain vigilant and do their part by getting vaccinated, wearing a mask, and staying home symptomatic. if Although the College has reached vaccination a landmark, this does not mean that our campus community can let down their efforts in the fight against COVID-19.
